HUMAN TRAFFICKING - MISSION FOR APRIL

The monthly mission, for April, is human trafficking. Many of us may not be aware that across the world millions of people, mostly women and children, are being kept against their will and are forced to work as laborers or in the sex trade industry. This issue is estimated to be a \$36 billion-a-year industry, globally.

In most third world and developing countries, woman and children are not respected, especially if they are lower class. They may be lured in to this life or sold by their own flesh and blood, and governments may turn the other way or even be participants in these crimes. Few victims are able to escape this existence alive.

We are very fortunate to live in a country with equal rights for all. Our laws are meant to protect us whether we are rich or poor, male or female, black or white. However, the U.S. is not immune to these incredibly heinous acts against humanity. Human trafficking is happening in our own society on a daily basis and is a \$10 billion industry in the United States alone. Sadly, it is everywhere to a degree. In fact, the hub for all human trafficking here in the U.S. is Atlanta, Georgia, where politicians and businessmen fly in everyday for meetings and conferences.

This modern day slavery is the human rights obstacle we must overcome this century, through prevention, education, advocacy and legislation. Thankfully, there are organizations in place to assist in freeing and counseling these victims. Polaris Project, an organization based out of Washington D.C., is a leader in the fight to end modern-day slavery. Polaris Project is transforming the way communities respond to human trafficking in the U.S. and globally. Polaris Project operates the 24-hour National Human Trafficking Resource Center hotline, advocates for strong laws to help victims and prosecute traffickers, provides lifesaving services to survivors, and is a respected source for training and information.

During the month of April, money collected for our church's Human Trafficking mission will be sent to Polaris Project to aid in the continuation of transforming the way communities and governments respond to human trafficking in the U.S. and globally, as well as, to assist victims in their freedom and recovery.

AUGLAIZE COUNTY CRISIS CENTER REQUESTS HELP

A large box has been placed on the stage marked "Crisis Center" in response to this request:

The Auglaize County Crisis Center is a family violence program that provides shelter as one component of their programs. While residing at the shelter, families receive food, shelter, case management, legal advocacy and programs that assist them in moving forward toward an independent selfdirected life. All of this is provided at no charge to the residents. The average number of residents housed at the shelter is 3-4. The year 2013 saw those numbers far exceed the average. At one time, the shelter housed seven families all at the same time! Because of the increased numbers, we find the supply cupboards almost bare. We hope this to be a short-term problem until another Day of Caring can be held, but, until then, we are asking for your help in restocking our supplies. Later, when they had hiked down the trail to the bottom of the cliff they met another party of climbers just starting up the face of the cliff. One of them shouted out, 'Hey, you guys! Anybody lose a contact lens?'

Well, that would be startling enough, but you know why the climber saw it? An ant was moving slowly across a twig on the face of the rock, carrying it!

OLD GUY AND A BUCKET OF SHRIMP

This is a true story. It happened every Friday evening, almost without fail, when the sun resembled a giant orange and was starting to dip into the blue ocean.

Old Ed came strolling along the beach to his favorite pier. Clutched in his bony hand was a bucket of shrimp. Ed walks out to the end of the pier, where it seems he almost has the world to himself. The glow of the sun is a golden bronze now. Everybody's gone, except for a few joggers on the beach. Standing out on the end of the pier, Ed is alone with his thoughts...and his bucket of shrimp. Before long, however, he is no longer alone. Up in the sky a thousand white dots come screeching and squawking, winging their way toward that lanky frame standing there on the end of the pier. Before long, dozens of seagulls have enveloped him, their wings fluttering and flapping wildly. Ed stands there tossing shrimp to the hungry birds. As he does, if you listen closely, you can hear him say with a smile, 'Thank you. Thank you.' In a few short minutes, the bucket is empty. But Ed doesn't leave. He stands there lost in thought, as though transported to another time and place. When he finally turns around and begins to walk back toward the beach, a few of the birds hop along the pier with him until he gets to the stairs, and then they, too, fly away. And old Ed quietly makes his way down to the end of the beach and on home. If you were sitting there on the pier with your fishing line in the water, Ed might seem like 'a funny old duck,' as my dad used to say. Or, 'a guy who's a sandwich shy of a picnic,' as my kids might say. To onlookers, he's just another old codger, lost in his own weird world, feeding the seagulls with a bucket full of shrimp. To the onlooker, rituals can look either very strange or very empty. They can seem altogether unimportant...maybe even a lot of nonsense. Old folks often do strange things, at least in the eyes of Boomers and Busters. Most of them would probably write Old Ed off, down there in Florida. That's too bad. They'd do well to know him better. His full name: Eddie Rickenbacker. He was a famous hero back in World War II. On one of his flying missions across the Pacific, he and his seven-member crew went down. Miraculously, all of the men survived, crawled out of their plane, and climbed into a life raft. Captain Rickenbacker and his crew floated for days on the rough waters of the Pacific. They fought the sun. They fought sharks. Most of all, they fought hunger. By the eighth day, their rations ran out. No food. No water. They were hundreds of miles from land and no one knew where they were. They needed a miracle. That afternoon they had a simple devotional service and prayed for a miracle. They tried to nap. Eddie leaned back and pulled his military cap over his

nose. Time dragged. All he could hear was the slap of the waves against the raft. Suddenly, Eddie felt something land on the top of his cap. It was a seagull! Old Ed would later describe how he sat perfectly still, planning his next move. With a flash of his hand and a squawk from the gull, he managed to grab it and wring its neck. He tore the feathers off, and he and his starving crew made a meal -- a very slight meal for eight men -- of it. Then, they used the intestines for bait. With it, they caught fish, which gave them food and more bait...and the cycle continued. With that simple survival technique, they were able to endure the rigors of the sea until they were found and rescued (after 24 days at sea). Eddie Rickenbacker lived many years beyond that ordeal, but he never forgot the sacrifice of that first life-saving seagull. And he never stopped saying, 'Thank you.' That's why almost every Friday night he would walk to the end of the pier with a bucket full of shrimp and a heart full of gratitude.


