#### FROM OUR PASTOR

At Advent, we recall the familiar carol:

Love came down at Christmas,

Love all lovely, Love divine; Love was born at Christmas;

Star and angels gave the sign.

During Advent and Christmas seasons, Love has, indeed, come to us as a tiny child, wrapped in bands of cloth, born to an unmarried young woman, in a faraway land.

As we journey together to Bethlehem, I invite you to join us for our seasonal celebrations throughout the month of December—in worship, in Christmas caroling, and in holiday gatherings.

At St. Paul UCC, there are many opportunities for you to embrace the coming of the Christ Child. You are invited to Saturday evening carol sings from 4:45 to 5:00 p.m. prior to the Saturday Evening Worship. Christmas caroling will take place on Sunday, December 7, at 2:00 p.m.—allowing families and individuals to participate in this ministry event to our neighbors. Following caroling, all are invited to the parsonage for refreshments. On Christmas Eve, the 5:00 p.m. service will be geared for "The Young and Young at Heart." Children of all ages will be able to participate in a Christmas pageant as we celebrate the birth of Christ. Also, on Christmas Eve, there will be candlelight services at both 8:00 and 11:00 p.m.

>Sunday, December 7. Second Sunday of Advent. Worship with communion. Congregational annual meeting at the end of worship. Caroling for all ages from 2:00 to 4:00 followed by fellowship time at the parsonage.

>Sunday, December 14. Third Sunday of Advent. Spirit Safari youth will lead worship in the sanctuary. That evening at 7:00 p.m., you are welcome back to St. Paul's sanctuary for a Christmas concert.

>Sunday, December 21. Fourth Sunday of Advent. The Chancel Choir and Bell Choir will lead worship. Christmas Family Fun Night in the Assembly Room from 6:00-8:00p.m.

>Christmas Eve 5:00 p.m. Worship for the Young and Young at Heart. We will sing carols and watch the events of Christmas Eve unfold before our eyes.

Candlelight worship at 8:00 and 11:00 p.m. with carols, anthems, preaching, and the celebration of the Light of Christ.

>Sunday, December 27-28. First Weekend after Christmas.

>Sunday, January 4. Epiphany Sunday and communion. That same afternoon, the Erb Strang family will host an Epiphany Open House at the parsonage from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m.—complete with refreshments and Epiphany cake.

The final verse of the carol is a reminder of the gift Christ is to us:

Love shall be our token; Love be yours and Love be mine; Love to God and neighbor, Love for plea and gift and sign.

## PROJECT OF YEAR UPDATE LUTHERAN CLINIC -- EL SALVADOR

Many years ago, our church chose to have a mission emphasis each year. On alternating years, the mission would be to support our local St. Paul Church, and then

the next year would be for the extended church. This year our mission emphasis is supporting the extended church.

So throughout this year of 2014, we have been raising money to support the salaries of the staff at the clinic in El Salvador. These folks are doctors, a lab technician, a pharmacist, and a dental assistant and most of their time is volunteered at the clinic. The patients get the same service if they can pay or can't pay the two-dollar fee per visit. This is why our church's mission chosen for this year is to support the staff at the clinic so they can receive a small salary every month for the next two years.

This past year, the Mission Team has held an ice cream social, a fish fry, a chicken dinner, and on two different occasions, a soup and sandwich luncheon after Sunday services. These fund raising events, plus the many donations throughout the year have, to this date, almost reached the \$12,000 goal. \$11,723.04 has been raised to date. We still have the month of December to receive donations and hope to go over this \$12,000 goal, thus giving the staff a modest raise.

The mission team, on behalf of the staff of the clinic and Bishop Medardo Gomez of the El Salvadoran Lutheran Church, are very appreciative of all of your generosity.

#### A FRESH, NEW NURSERY!



Jesus is Knocking Window



**The Good Shepherd Window** 



'Knocking' will be silent for a while.

If you've not heard Jesus knocking at the door in the St. Paul sanctuary, it's not because you haven't been listening or forgot your hearing aid. You won't hear — or see — that sound until at least March... maybe longer.

The large stained glass window on the north side of the sanctuary will be a learning challenge while it's removed for restoration, according to Richard Richert of Dayton Art Glass. He spent more than a year addressing challenges in restoring the Good Shepherd window, recently re-installed on the south side of the sanctuary.

Richert, in his 35th year of restoring stained glass windows, said there are "wood and masonry situations" to address St. Paul's latest undertaking to refurbish all of the sanctuary windows. Wrinkled paint and cracks on the north wall are evidence of the church building settling on the Second Street side. The wall will need to be fixed, Richert said, so the newly framed window will fit into its original opening — and not be subject to the stresses that have caused the window to deteriorate.

The current pine frame was covered in ages-old caulk and layers of paint one-eighth inch thick. The new frame will be fabricated in poplar, a sturdier wood, and anchored and sealed with modern materials "to make it better; bring it up to 21st Century standards," Richert said.

Another modern innovation is solar-powered ventilation between the stained glass and its storm window. This will be similar to the Good Shepherd window, in which fans automatically turn on at 90 degrees to control temperatures that can reach 180 degrees and cause damage. It was cold conditions, however, that delayed the first stages of restoring the north window.

Richert said he had scheduled November 17 to remove the round dove window atop the large image of Jesus knocking on the door. That was the second day of the area's first snows and wind chills near zero degrees — hazardous conditions for handling stained glass. Richert simply stated that "Mother Nature slowed us down." He said he could heat the tent outside the window and remove the stained glass and storm protection in 30-degree weather.

Good news, Richert said, is that this window "will have less of a learning curve because we learned so much taking out and restoring the (south) window." His crew used a heated soap-and-water solution and museum-quality chemicals to clean the south window without any abrasives. The crumbled lead was replaced with a restoration alloy of lead, tin and silver and these processes will be used on the north window.

Richert's original estimate was to begin re-installing the window in March 2015 ... but Mother Nature may play a role in the revised schedule

### This 'n That

#### THE SMALL WHITE ENVELOPE

It's just a small, white envelope stuck among the branches of our Christmas tree. No name, no identification, no inscription. It has peeked through the branches of our tree for the past ten years or so.

It all began because my husband Mike hated Christmas--oh, not the true meaning of Christmas, but the commercial aspects of it—overspending, the frantic running around at the last minute to get a tie for Uncle Harry and the dusting powder for Grandma---the gifts given in desperation because you couldn't think of anything else.

Knowing he felt this way, I decided one year to bypass the usual shirts, sweaters, ties and so forth. I reached for something special just for Mike. The inspiration came in an unusual way.

Our son Kevin, who was 12 that year, was wrestling at the junior level at the school he attended; and shortly before Christmas, there was a non-league match against a team sponsored by an inner city church.

These youngsters, dressed in sneakers so ragged that shoestrings seemed to be the only thing holding them together, presented a sharp contrast to our boys in their spiffy blue and gold uniforms and sparkling new wrestling shoes. As the match began, I was alarmed to see that the other team was wrestling without headgear, a kind of light helmet designed to protect a wrestler's ears.

It was a luxury the ragtag team obviously could not afford. Well, we ended up walloping them. We took every weight class. And as each of their boys got up from the mat, he swaggered around in his tatters with false bravado, a kind of street pride that couldn't acknowledge defeat.

Mike, seated beside me, shook his head sadly, "I wish just one of them could have won," he said. "They have a lot of potential, but losing like this could take the heart right out of them."

Mike loved kids - all kids - and he knew them, having coached little league football, baseball and lacrosse. That's when the idea for his present came. That afternoon, I went to a local sporting goods store, bought an assortment of wrestling headgear and shoes, and sent them anonymously to the inner city church. On Christmas Eve, I placed the envelope on the tree, the note inside telling Mike what I had done and that this was his gift from me. His smile was the brightest thing about Christmas that year and in succeeding years. For each Christmas, I followed the tradition--one year sending a group of mentally handicapped youngsters to a hockey game, another year a check to a pair of elderly brothers whose home had burned to the ground the week before Christmas, and on and on.

The envelope became the highlight of our Christmas. It was always the last thing opened on Christmas morning and our children, ignoring their new toys, would

stand with wide-eyed anticipation as their dad lifted the envelope from the tree to reveal its contents.

As the children grew, the toys gave way to more practical presents, but the envelope never lost its allure. The story doesn't end there.

You see, we lost Mike last year due to dreaded cancer. When Christmas rolled around, I was still so wrapped in grief that I barely got the tree up. But Christmas Eve found me placing an envelope on the tree, and in the morning, it was joined by three more.

Each of our children, unbeknownst to the others, had placed an envelope on the tree for their dad. The tradition has grown and someday will expand even further with our grandchildren standing to take down the envelope.

Mike's spirit, like the Christmas spirit will always be with us. May we all remember Christ, who is the reason for the season, and the true Christmas spirit this year and always.
