

#### FROM OUR PASTOR

The Isle of Iona off the western shore of Scotland is the spiritual home of the Iona Community—an ecumenical Christian community that crosses borders, culture and denominations. The Iona Community seeks justice in the world by following the way of Christ Jesus.

About a dozen years ago, the Iona Community published a small book for the Lenten and Easter Season called <u>Lent & Easter Readings from Iona</u>. In this volume, the Rev. Kathy Galloway writes, "This is the meaning of resurrection, that we can dance."

During March at St. Paul UCC, we will continue our Lenten journey, travel through Holy Week and sing Easter's alleluias. To paraphrase Rev. Galloway, we will be given our dancing shoes this month that we might dance in joyous celebration of Christ's resurrection.

You are invited to take part in the Lenten and Easter journey at St. Paul Church. We will share in Holy Communion during the weekend of March 9-10. The youth of our congregation will lead worship on March 17. Young people will be confirmed into the life of the congregation during worship on Palm Sunday, March 24.

Our Maundy Thursday Healing Service will include Communion, healing prayers, and candle lighting at 7:30 p.m. St. Paul Church will host the Ecumenical Good Friday service in our Sanctuary at 7:00 p.m. (Please note the difference in the worship start times!) Then we will celebrate Christ's resurrection on Sunday, March 31, with worship and Holy Communion at 7:00 a.m. and 10:15 a.m.

As we continue this journey together, I share with you lona Community member Neil Paynter's prayer for Easter:

O Christ, Lord of the Dance in you we live and move and have our being

Through your body and blood our sins are forgiven and all we carry which is heavy you take upon yourself

So that we may dance again and give thanks and celebrate life

Let us celebrate

Let us share the bread and the wine

the bread that dances with the atoms of the revolving earth

the wine that shimmers with the light of the Christ's Love

#### MARCH MISSION PROJECT

 $\underline{\text{What}}$  is our March mission project? It is NuVizion UCC.

<u>Where</u> is it located? It is located on Cherry Street in Toledo, OH across the street from St. Vincent Hospital. It is the lowest-income, highest-crime neighborhood in the metro Toledo area.

<u>When</u> did NuVizion become a church? They came into existence 9 years ago on February 2.

<u>Why</u> was this church established? It was established to help the poor and homeless people of the Toledo area.

<u>How</u> do they help these folks? In addition to worship services, Bible study and fellowship opportunities, they also provide community meals, a food bank, health-hygiene assistance and legal aid. They also have a free store where people can get clothing and a coffee house where breakfasts are provided. They do all of this with limited kitchen facilities, very limited funds, volunteer help and only one paid staff person, Rev. Will Stuart.

<u>How</u> can we help? We can help by making a daily sacrifice in our Lenten coin folder, by making a generous donation in our Easter envelope or by using the envelopes found in our Sunday bulletins.

In Isaiah 58 where the Lord was asked about fasting, he said "The kind of fasting I want is this: Share your food with the hungry and open your home to the homeless poor. Give clothes to those who have nothing to wear!!"

So as you prepare for Easter, keep this in mind and do what you can to help our sisters and brothers at NuVizion.

In some faith statements, I remember hearing about defining times when someone felt their faith really take shape. I don't have any such moment that I remember. Mine seems to have always been there. Doubts don't seem to hang around long. There have always been positive things to counter them. I have moments that reassure me that God is real.

My great, great, great grandfather, Behrend Mohrmann, held services in his home until he founded this church, so when I was born it was only natural that I would be baptized, attend Sunday school, be confirmed and become a member here.

It seemed like my family always attended church and many of my family sang in the choir and so I have been a choir member from the time I could. It's just natural.

I was born the youngest of six children just ten days after my father died. Growing up, I didn't realize just how hard it must have been for my mother with six children 17 and younger. The oldest boy and younger girl had vision problems and lost most of their sight by the time they were in their teens. I think I was well into my adult years before I realized they were "handicapped". I grew up with this and they were normal to me. I remember being their eyes when they had to go to Dayton to the eye doctor. We would take the bus. They knew where to go and how to get there. I only had to help a little. It was just what family did. It was natural. They both ended up living on their own --my sister at a younger age than my brother. I learned so much from them.

I don't remember hearing "I love you" much between family members growing up, but I didn't need to. I felt safe, secure and cared for....loved. I know there were disagreements and harsh words at times. All families have some friction, but I remember everyone helping each other and doing what was needed. It was natural.

My wife and I were blessed with 4 children, although there are others who choose to call us Mom and Dad. We have blood and step grandchildren and also non-related children who call us grandparents. We feel blessed. I see the spirit of family cooperation and helping continuing. This is good.

When our older son hung on my arm and begged me to become a Webelos Scout leader when there was none, I became involved in Cub Scouts. When our younger son went into Boy Scouts I became involved in Boy Scouts. I was Scoutmaster until I took a job that took me out of town so much I felt I could not be effective any more and stepped down. Along the way I also had some other scouting positions.

Besides being a choir member and currently a trustee, I served as a deacon twice.

God has blessed me with great health and a great mind. I think I am as healthy as people 20 or 30 years younger than I am. I am no genius and I never went to collage, but I feel I was blessed with a logical mind and a lot of common sense. This has enabled me to do a good job at work and allowed me to do things and go places, that as a child, I never would have dreamed possible with my background and from little old New Bremen, Ohio. I have worked in at least 9 countries other than the USA and passed through more while traveling for my job.

I have also had challenges in life. There were times when things could have been a lot better. I choose not to dwell on those times and events. There were times when I must have had "sucker" written on my forehead—times that I just felt used. I need to get over that. I pretty much knew going in what could happen. After all, I might just do it again. It's just natural to want to help.

My wife and children are very dear to me. We almost always all get together for major holidays and special occasions. For the last five and a half years it has not been as good as it used to be. Our older son committed suicide just after he turned 39 and it has left a large hole. Although God has given me some understanding, the emptiness is always there. You may wonder, how does anyone ever get over something like that? Personally, I don't think you can. But you do have to learn to accept the fact that it did happen and life goes on. The hurt is pretty much forever.

How many times have we all wondered why can't life be perfect—no hatred, no fighting, no war, no sickness, no whatever? I've asked those questions many times. Not so much anymore though. The same answer kept popping up in my head. "This isn't heaven."

There have been times in my life when personal safety issues have made my mind think of what could go wrong and what to do if it does. This has saved me from harm more than once.

I believe in God, that Jesus Chris lived, and I have felt the Holy Spirit. What more do I need? To me, it's natural.


